- constructive criticism and people with experience with writing to help you along. You'll get this with a critique group.
- Find an editor! When you finish your book, do not use your Aunt Sue, an English teacher, or anyone other than a <u>book</u> <u>editor</u>. After you make changes from the editor's notes, consider a proofreader to make sure you have not left any stragglers on the page.
